Clinical Psychologist/Mental Health Counsellor

Overview	Clinical psychologists meet with clients to identify problems—emotional, mental and behavioral—in their lives. Through observation, interviews and tests, the psychologist will diagnose any existing or potential disorders. Then, together with the client, they formulate a program of treatment according to the client's needs. Psychologists monitor the client's progress on a regular basis to ensure that their needs are met by the course of action, and to adjust it if necessary. They work in various settings including private chambers, educational institutions, hospital and community settings, etc. May need to travel from one location to other (e.g., school to school). However, research psychologists mostly work in offices, labs, and hospital settings.

Notes/Other Information	There is not a huge difference in salary between holding a Master's degree or a PhD. With a Master's degree, one can become a Chartered Psychologist or be a college professor. Requirements to providing psychological services varies from province to province. A Master's degree or PhD does not guarantee eligibility to practice. An individual needs the required graduate

degree, one year of supervised practice, and a pass on the oral and written exam on practice and ethical issues.

- A doctoral degree in psychology is required in order to use the designation "Psychologist" in Prince Edward Island, Quebec, Ontario, Manitoba and British Columbia.
- A master's degree in psychology is required for the designation "Psychologist" in Newfoundland and Labrador, Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, Saskatchewan, Alberta, the Northwest Territories and Nunavut.
- A master's degree in psychology is required in order to use the designation "Psychological Associate" in Prince Edward Island, Ontario, Manitoba and British Columbia.

Hours of work vary depending on many factors such as the needs of clients. Work hours may combine regular office hours with some evenings and weekends.

Steps towards capacity building to become competitive for this job

Obtaining an MSc. degree may or may not be followed by a PhD degree. Finding a supervisor and position to obtain the required supervised experience through the connection and/or practicum made by the program. After that passing the licensing exams (Examination for Professional Practice in Psychology [EPPP]) should make one competitive for the job market.
